


Third Base

From the Pastor

Ten years ago, Dr. Aliou Niang, professor at *Memphis Theological Seminary*, suggested I purchase a copy of the *Harper Collins Study Bible* (New Revised Standard Version).

The front cover is now falling apart at the seams—25% of the back pages are dark and well-worn, 75% of the front pages are lighter.

The worn pages contain the New Testament, and the lighter shades (except for Psalms and a few Prophets) is the Hebrew Bible (Old Testament).

The Old Testament is a challenging journey: poetry, history, sermons, prophetic declarations are mixed together and written by several authors.

The prophets' words are declared for their present audience and "still to come" events —not clearly defined. The contemporary criticisms of patriarchy, violence and xenophobia are ever present. The petitions, lists, instructions for proper conduct in two temples destroyed long ago seem a waste of effort and time.

Where are the well-worn pages on your Bible? I suspect Galatians and Romans are tattered a bit more than Leviticus or 1 Chronicles.

Therefore, I want to offer you a summer challenge.

Take practical steps to increase your knowledge and appreciation of the Old Testament.

Here's a roadmap:

- Read Philip Yancey's *The Bible Jesus Read* (a used copy on Amazon is \$5). The book recounts Yancey's avoidance of the Old Testament—to ultimately discovering its rich rewards.
- Learn to read Hebrew (*I see your eye roll, you can do it*)!
- Purchase Miko Shaffier's Learn To Read Hebrew In Six Weeks (\$20 on Amazon or \$9 in Kindle format). You'll understand and apply 22 Hebrew consonants and a few vowels. Most importantly, you'll discover Hebrew's style of brevity and concreteness—it is more Cormac McCarthy than William Faulkner.
- "Context, context, context!" is your friend and companion. Memorize the following dates and events—most of the Old Testament will fall under the first and second temple, pre-exilic, exilic, and post-exilic periods.

Pre-Exilic/First Temple Period:

The United Monarchy was under Kings Saul, David, and Solomon—*The First Temple* was built during Solomon's reign.

The Divided Kingdom, after King Solomon, split between North (Israel) South (Judah) around 930BC.

Assyrians conquered, exiled, and *repopulated* Israel (the North) with "foreigners" in 722BC.

Exilic Period (587BC-538BC)

Babylonians conquered Judah (South), destroyed the Temple and exiled a good portion of population to Babylon in 587BC.

Post Exilic/Second Temple Period (538BC) The

Medo-Persian King Cyrus conquered Babylon and absorbed all its lands in 539BC.

King Cyrus, in 538BC, declared exiled Jews may return and rebuild the *Second Temple*—dedicated in 515BC. Ezra returned from Babylon to teach the Law in 445BC.

Nehemiah returned from Susa (capital of Persia) to rebuild Jerusalem's ruined walls in 445BC.

The full richness of the New Testament cannot be appreciated without knowledge of the Old—it is the Bible Jesus read. Jesus incorporated *Old Testament metaphors* into communicating his *mission*— Lamb of God, Shepherd, Sign of Jonah, Stone which the Builders Rejected.

Remember Paul's advice to young Timothy:
But as for you, continue in what you have learned
and firmly believed, knowing from whom you
learned it and how from childhood you have known
the sacred writings, that are able to instruct
for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All
scripture is inspired by God and is useful for
teaching, reproof, correction, and training in
righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to
God may be proficient and equipped for
every good work.

Paul's reference to Scripture is the Bible Jesus Read—the Old Testament.

Amen!



Musical Moment

On a popular return from pre-Covid days, Brent Johnson organized a viewing of Our Hospitality, the 1923 Buster Keaton silent movie, on May 26th – to a crowd of at least 100 people!

The rousing organ accompaniment was performed by Joshua Stafford. Joshua is the Minister of Music at First Congregational Church in Columbus, Ohio and Director of Sacred Music at the Chautauqua Institute in New York.



August 4th will bring another organ concert to Third, this one featuring Nathan Avakian from New York.

Nathan is renowned for blending twenty-first century virtual instrument technology with theatre organ music and creates performances that satisfy contemporary musical tastes and pay tribute to the historical legacy of the organ. He was commissioned to compose seven original theatre organ soundtracks for the International Youth Silent Film Festival, a program that challenges young filmmakers to create contemporary silent films to theatre organ music. Nathan helped pioneer the festival's expansion which now includes regional festivals in Oregon, Missouri, Adelaide and Melbourne, Australia.

Nathan currently works as a freelance lighting designer and design associate with organizations including Princeton University, New York Stage and Film, Purchase Opera, and the Lighting Design Group. On his YouTube channel Nathan can be seen bringing music from movies such as The Incredibles, Bohemian Rhapsody, Brittany Spears, and Uptown Funk by Mark Ronson to life using both traditional organ pipes and digital recordings.

The evening will include something unique: a collection of short films (3min each) from the International Youth Silent Film Festival. This is a filmmaking competition for students 20 and younger to create short silent films to organ soundtracks. As Director of the Festival, Nathan composes the soundtracks first, then filmmakers make movies to fit the music. You can see examples of these films on the IYSFF website: www.makesilentfilm.com.

Exploring Psalm 119 via daily reading and Tommy's Podcast

Psalms Chapter 119 תְּהַלִּים

You are encouraged to compliment your depth of understanding the Psalms by reading one stanza (eight verses) from Psalm 119 each day, for 22 days. We began this journey with the Sunday, June 25th sermon, but start when you are able, if not already!

For example, start on:

Day 1: read Alef stanza, Psalm 119:1-8, 1 of 22 stanzas

Day 2: read Bet stanza, Psalm 119:9-16, 2 of 22 stanzas, and so on.

Psalm 119 was written as a memory device, an instrument to consider and meditate on God's word and direction. The writer of Psalm 119 wanted to *say everything there was to say—from A to Z*. Or, using Hebrew: from **Alef** to the last letter in the Hebrew Alphabet—**TAV**.

To aid in your study and also provide additional background and context, each day after you read listen to Tommy's Podcast, via <u>Buzzsprout</u>.


