Who is the only artist to have one song simultaneously in both the top 10 of Country and Rock Charts?

Answer: Jason Bradley DeFord of Antioch, TN.

An opinion piece in The New York Times was entitled *Can Jelly Roll Heal the Broken Soul of America?* (Jason's mom nicknamed her son Jelly Roll.)

My curiosity was piqued and I decided to spend an evening with Jelly Roll at Saint Louis' Hollywood Amphitheater. The Amphitheater was *packed*.

The crowd was diverse, I may have been the only living soul without a tattoo. I inhaled enough secondhand marijuana, to flunk a drug test for the next three months.

The lights went out, and the crowd roared with expectation.

A video screen descended from the rafters onstage. A tatted up middle-aged man was sitting in a pickup truck and offered an introduction:

My life was at an end. And while incarcerated I began listening to Jelly Roll, and his music guided me to faith in Jesus. Now, I am sober, out of jail, employed and reconnected with my daughter, and she is present at this concert tonight, and graduating college with honors. Jelly, if you receive this video, it would be my honor to introduce you when you arrive in my hometown of Saint Louis. All I can say is thank you.

The crowd responded with Joy, Amen, and a few more puffs on the pipe. Jelly walked on stage.

And from my cheap seats on the lawn, he was easy to recognize. He seemed to have a "I can't believe this is happening" look on his face. Jelly spread his arms wide to embrace the crowd and then pointed one finger to his heart, "thank you, thank you, thank you."

Jelly's introduction reminded me of our Welcome at Third: "we are gathered for community, we need one another, we are going to love one another. We are family!"

I hope young ones in families had their ears covered during the concert that night. The profanity of Jelly Roll reminded me of Ralphie's description of his father in *A Christmas Story*:

My father worked in profanity the way other artists might work on oils or clay. It was his true medium. A master.

The profanity was never spoken in anger, but was inserted as nouns, adjectives, and adverbs. Jelly's music and message is derived from brokenness; he was incarcerated several times, a drug dealer, and alcoholic.

Son of A Sinner was inspired by his frequent visits to strip clubs in East Saint Louis.

I'm just a long-haired son of a sinner
Searching for new ways I can get gone
I'm a pedal to the highway
If you ever wonder why we write these songs
'Cause I'm only one drink away from the
devil

I'm only one call away from home.

He talked comfortably of his faith and turning his life over to God, but at times also drinks too much, and is a proponent for legalized marijuana. From *The Lost:*

I've been known to find my kind of people That ain't at home underneath church steeples

You'd be surprised the places I find Jesus That ain't the regular crowd.

I've been down and out. I'm better with the lost than the found.

Jelly tells a story about his daughter inviting him to attend a small country church, she had discovered community in a youth group. He went along to support his daughter and prejudices about church began to fade, he was thankful for a place his daughter could discover family, faith, and community.

The concert was full of paradox and wild swings from the sacred to profane.

But those gathered *loved* this artist, and listened respectfully, while a bit stoned, on his message of God, community, and brokenness.

One obvious connection was with the incarcerated and those suffering from addictions.

I took a break and navigated through bodies and smoke to courtyard for a drink. An elderly man with a weathered face and kind smile was standing in line (of course, muscled and tattooed).

How May I Pray For You? written in white was clearly seen on his black t shirt.

Friend, where did you get your shirt?

I made it myself. My life was a mess. God saved me. And I feel called to pray with those who need encouragement and hope.

And they come up to you?

Oh yes, about 30 tonight. I'm not pushy, I'm just a servant, here if needed.

And he said "have a blessed night," and walked back to the amphitheater.

I left before the encore. There was no way I'm getting stuck in this traffic and my lungs are full of marijuana smoke - and I have to preach tomorrow.

But one stanza from *Save Me*, has stayed with me:

Somebody save me, me from myself
I've spent so long living in Hell
They say my lifestyle is bad for my health
It's the only thing that seems to help.

All of this drinkin' and smokin' is hopeless But feel like it's all that I need. Somethin' inside of me's broken I hold on to anything that sets me free.


I'm a lost cause Baby, don't waste your time on me. I'm so damaged beyond repair.


We'll also be offering hats, gloves, and scarves in children and teen (or adult) sizes.
