



From the Pastor

Whatever I have is yours, as Colton rummaged through albums purchased in 70's.

He passed on Neil Diamond, Kenny Rogers and Chicago—opting for Zeppelin, Cream and Beatles.

A large section was untouched— Chuck Girard, Love Song, Barry McGwire, Pat Terry Group, Second Chapter of Acts and Phil Keaggy—all artists from the Jesus Rock movement of late '60's and early 70's. I haven't played or reviewed in decades.

I placed a few on record player and heard familiar crackle, pop, and skip from 45-yearold albums. I turned to Spotify and reviewed artists from my Jesus Rock collection.

The memories of another time and place touched my heart—listening to this genre in pristine condition. I was once again 16 years old, in bell-bottom jeans – sitting next to my speakers with perfect balance of bass and treble (don't touch my levels!).

But one album stood out— Larry Norman's *Only Visiting This Planet.* And I remembered lyrics without hesitation:

Life is filled with guns and wars and everyone got trampled on the floor; I wish we'd all been ready.

Children died the days grew cold, a piece of bread would buy a bag of gold; there's no time to change your mind, the Son has come and you've been left behind.

The song, *Why Should the Devil Have All the Good Music*, explained to a "traditionalist:" it is not a sin for Christians to grow long hair and play rock music with Jesus lyrics— because present hymns sound like funeral marches.

The cover of *Only Visiting This Planet* (above) is Larry walking in the middle of LA rush hour traffic— "is this all there is?"

I listened from beginning to end—a superb mixture of social justice and a call to salvation.

I was curious about reviews and googled away:

Only Visiting This Planet was inducted into the Library of Congress' National Recording Registry in 2013 as an album of cultural significance.

U2's Bono, in Rolling Stone interview, cites *Only Visiting This Planet* as an influential album, "Larry Norman was the first guy who made me think that you could be a Christian and rock 'n' roll musician at the same time."

Norman suffered bipolar trauma from a plane crash in 1978, was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame in 2001, and passed away at 60 in 2008.

Christian Rock Historian John J. Thompson compared Norman's impact on Christian contemporary music to John Lennon's influence on rock & roll and Bob Dylan's to folk music.

"Jesus Music Artists" were partners in my spiritual birth and adolescence. And now, 49 years later, it's a healthy exercise remembering fervor and idealism of first discovering Jesus and soundtrack from those early years.

First loves are passionate and you have a natural longing for past days of "idealism and innocence."

But faith is grounded on solid rock, as you're confronted with evil, suffering and injustice. True Love is not dependent on passion of first experience, ecstasy or limerence. The directionally accurate way to finish the race is placing Love on Solid Rock—withstanding the inevitable wind, rain, and storms.

Norman was a cultural critic of hard times and offered clear solution without apology. From the Only Visiting This Planet album, *Why Don't You Look Into Jesus?*

Sipping whiskey from a paper cup You drown your sorrows till you can't stand up Take a look at what you've done to yourself Why don't you put the bottle back on the shelf

Why don't you look into Jesus?

Gonorrhea on Valentine's Day And you're still looking for the perfect lay You think rock and roll will set you free You'll be deaf before you're thirty-three Why don't you look into Jesus?

Think back to when you were a child Your soul was free, your heart ran wild Each day was different and life was a thrill You knew tomorrow would be better still But things have changed, you're much older now If you're unhappy and you don't know how Why don't you look into Jesus? He's got the answer

Norman could get his point across in economy of words:

The Beatles said, All You Need is Love and then they broke up.

I remain ever grateful for these "Jesus Freaks"—mostly from Southern California accompanying first steps of my pilgrimage.

The St. Louis Chamber Chorus spent a few evenings in February recording music for an album to be released within the next year. The recording label is Regent Records from Wolverhampton, England. A producer came over from England to oversee the recording.



We Wayfarers have come through an exceedingly interesting and practical study of an often overlooked spiritual discipline—hospitality.

Missions Focus: CBF Global Missions ~ Easter Offering

Cooperative Baptist Fellowship Global Missions mobilizes missionaries to share the love and compassion of Jesus Christ in 18 countries around the world. Responding to God's call and empowered by the Holy Spirit, field personnel cultivate community, bear witness to Jesus Christ and seek transformational development among people who have been forgotten and forsaken by others. CBF's field personnel serve alongside congregations and local ministry partners within three contexts: global poverty, global migration and the global church.

The Offering for Global Missions secures the *long-term presence* of all CBF field personnel. Securing the presence of our missionaries translates as their salaries, benefits, housing, and children's educational needs. Our OGM dollars go 100% to keeping field personnel funded long-term.

Presence is different than programming. Programming support encompasses the costs of various projects or programs. Field personnel raise support from friends, family, and other partners to fund their mission programming.

Because of generous giving to our Third Baptist's World Missions account, your mission's team was able to send \$2,000 to Scarlette Jasper recently. She is our CBF missionary in Corbin, Kentucky. This gift was for *programming*. With cold weather at hand, I anticipate our gift will allow for warm coats, blankets and other warming supplies.

A recent newsletter from Scarlette highlighted another program that was provided at Christmas where a partner donated shoes. They had received over 600 requests for shoes in eastern Kentucky and Tennessee. Not only were new shoes distributed, but Christmas toys as well. The stories of children receiving shoes and Christmas toys was touching.
