From the Pastor



The fish (Greek: ἰχθύς, ichthys) became an enduring symbol in early Christianity—birthed during period of persecution.

The symbol arose from an acrostic:

- Ἰησοῦς (Iēsous) – Jesus
- Χριστός (Christos) – Christ
- Θεοῦ (Theou) – of God
- Υἱός (Huios) – Son
- Σωτήρ (Sōtēr) – Savior

→ ἸΧΘΥΣ = “fish”

(notice 5 Greek letters in above image, middle section, bottom row)

The 175th Anniversary Art Project, designed by Sydney Sanker includes visual images of spiritual pilgrimage from Third members painted on ceramic hexagons creating outline of fish.

Avery Brooks photographed angels in Bellefontaine Cemetery, established in 1849, one year before Third's birth in 1850.

The angels bookend Sydney's creation:

- The left angel signifies hope in Christ, shadowed by the cross with right hand raised in joyous anticipation.
- The right angel, with face downcast, weeping, with both hands covering head in sorrow—reveals pain of mortality, death and separation.


Seven generations have traveled dramas of death, separation, and pain as members of Third Baptist Church.

The fish carried a bold message—a creed of defiance against the empire and spirit of the age.

JESUS	CHRIST	GOD'S	SON	SAVIOR
Iesous	Christos	Theou	Huios	Soter

This is the hope and message of Third Baptist Church, entering year 176—with relationship dynamic echoed by wisdom of the Apostle John:

Love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him.

In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us, so much, we also ought to love one another...There is no fear in love...

Beloved, let us boldly travel together and finish well...

2025 was a full year for missions at Third Baptist Church. Most notably, we enjoyed visits from several missionaries. Meeting missionaries face to face and hearing their stories blesses our congregation in many ways. This summer, Vera Ramsey introduced us to her friend, Whitney Morreau Zulu. Born in Paducah, Ky she has visited and worked in Zambia dedicating her life to serving by working with community schools to improve their standard of education. Dr. Dan and Sarah Chetti visited in November bringing updates about their ministry in Beirut, Lebanon and the greater Middle East. Stories coming from the Middle East remind us that our God's spirit is on the move in that part of the world.

November's focus on missions through our 175 years highlighted connections from 1894 when Said Jreidini was baptized at Third Baptist and subsequently returned to Beirut to found the First Baptist Church in the Middle East. His work continues to grow and thrive today. Other connections are discovered from the late 1950's when a Third member, Gloria Pierce Marshall and her husband travel to the Belgium Congo (later Democratic Republic of Congo) as missionaries. Today the Rice's minister in Congo.

Our final project of the year was providing Christmas to 23 children who are part of the Christian Activity Center of East St. Louis. Many of our congregation participated either by donating, playing Santa and shopping or wrapping and delivering gifts.

Please note that through 2025, our budgeted mission funds were used primarily to send support for our missionaries. During the month of December, any remaining funds will be sent to the missionaries we support as a Christmas gift.]

Our Mission offerings were used to support several important projects and ministries that included: Olive Branch ministries (Scarlette Jasper), Enduring Love (Chettis), Hurricane Helene relief (CBF), Ukrainian Refugee relief (ABCIM), Fistula Campaign (Rice's), Gateway180 (Fire restoration), and Jamaica hurricane relief (CBF).

Our Easter Offering and Christmas (2024) offering together raised \$13,372 which goes directly to assure all missionaries are supported financially and may remain on the mission field.

From the Director of Music – Dr. Philip Barnes

I wanted to share with you the message I received from composer David Bednall in England. You will recall that TBC commissioned him to write a new piece in honor of Brent's 20 years at the church, and Sunday, November 30th, we sang *With A Voice of Singing* to enrich the worship, and we partnered it with two of David's earlier works – the *Venite* ("O Come, Let Us Sing") and the piano *Lullaby* he wrote for his goddaughter.

I hope you will be cheered by his reaction. He is not only a fine composer, but also a much accomplished church musician, having studied at The Queen's College, Oxford, and then served on the music staff at Wells and Bristol Cathedrals. He is now director of music at Clifton Cathedral, and the University Organist in Bristol. [I shall point out to him where Brent used the tibia organ stop, never fear!]
