

# From the Pastor

It's around midnight October 14—and with two bulldogs snoring away on my lap—I'm watching Frank Capra's Arsenic and Old Lace on TCM—an uplifting story of a theater critic discovering his two elderly aunts serve poisoned elderberry wine to lonely gentleman callers.

Josephine Hull and Jean Adair play the two aunts. Josephine enjoyed a 50-year career and won academy award for Best Supporting Actress in Harvey. Jean began singing comedy in vaudeville—and fashioned her craft in the theater— before her breakout performance in Arsenic and Old Lace—a role she originated on Broadway. The movie version was released September 1, 1944.

On this day, Patton's U.S. Third Army was temporarily slowed due to gasoline shortage—clearing a path through France and into heartland of Germany following D-Day.

A few blocks from Third Baptist, Hal Newhouser won his 22nd game, when the Detroit Tigers beat Saint Louis Browns before 14,030 fans. One month later, all six games of 1944 World Series are played down the street as the Cards beat Saint Louis Browns in six games.

I suspect a good number of Americans went to Sportsman's Park or the opening of *Arsenic and Old Lace* to escape for a couple hours—two months from D-Day and waiting for loved ones to return home.

And around 80 years later, on a chilly October night in 2024, I'm escaping through sports and enjoying Josephine and Jean's poisoning escapade.

Escaping from what? Information overload.

The most effective mode of persuasion is fear. And it seems we are counting down for the most crucial event of our lifetime— a presidential election scheduled for Tuesday, November 5th! This is the most crucial election in our lifetimes... until congressional elections in 2026 and another presidential in 2028.

And whether your preferred candidate wins or loses one thing is assured— promises will not match reality due to "laws of the great unknown." Presidents navigate unforeseen crises written into their story—sometimes of such import that any promises are placed in background, dealing with an unexpected five alarm fire. Presidents plan and promise, but as Mike Tyson surmised, plans change when you get punched in the mouth.

How could voters in the 1940 election know Pearl Harbor was one year away, and an Atomic age was around the corner, and the world was entering deadliest conflict in human history – 55 to 80 million dead.

In recent memory, remember the controversy of 2000 election of hanging chads—results delayed for weeks. How could George Bush, Al Gore, or American voters know *everything* would change on September 11, 2001.

Therefore, I encourage you to seek balance as rhetoric and fear boils over before, during, and after election.

Take a break and enjoy an Arsenic and Old Lace moment.

Understand persuasion by fear is always an instrument of politics. The Apostle Paul knew death was near and encouraged young Timothy—

"God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of love, and of power and a sound mind."

And with a sound mind—understand Presidents and you—can plan, dream and communicate future vision—but it must be tinged with absolute assurance—that unforeseen crisis will change trajectory of your story, promises and future.

All the more reason to build your house on the Rock, because storms, planned and unplanned, are on the way. Well, its 1:05 a.m., but I still want to watch a few more scenes from Arsenic and Old Lace and tip my hat to Josephine and Jean—for offering much needed laughs for anxious movie goers on September 1, 1944, and another viewer in Saint Louis 80 years later... now down to one bulldog snoring away...


