### From the Pastor

The Jericho Road was well traveled but dangerous road connecting Jericho with Jerusalem. The winding hill, valleys, and crevices placed pilgrims and travelers at risk.

God has called Third to exist on The Jericho Road—as members and guests arrive from 30 different zip codes—from Chesterfield to Edwardsville.

And you are not shielded from God's children suffering hardship, begging in the street or finding rest and shade from one of Third's canopies.

The first impulse from Third is to inquire: Are you thirsty? Come in from the heat or cold and share a drink.

Are you hungry? Brother or sister walk with me to the Fellowship Hall and sit around the table—I'll serve you donuts and coffee and food from our pantry.

Third's diverse community travels the Jericho Road and arrives at Grand and Washington—urban and suburban followers of Jesus Christ—ministering with place and population God has planted us.

Third matters.

In our present context: the neighbors and membership gather around the Table of Grace as artists, lawyers, teachers along with dear ones struggling with sight and physical challenges, poverty and economic hardship.

Third reflects Paul's magnificent description of Christians in Galatians:

There is "neither Jew nor Greek; Male or Female; Slave or Free; for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

For the past 10 years we've recited familiar litany as "Third's signature" before partaking of The Lord's Supper by asking, "Who is welcome to the Table of the LORD?"

Everyone.

Everyone? The Democrat, Republican, or Independent - and even disliked Samaritans - written into your story?

Yes, all are welcome to partake of the Table of Grace.

Third matters.

And this message matters in a culture determined to divide and demonize "the other."

Third's focus is Jesus Christ and sharing Gospel to all—and each of us sit around fellowship tables—respecting differences but unified by:

Jesus Crucified.

Jesus Resurrected.

Discipleship guided by "iron sharpeneth iron."

And all agree, without equivocation:

God so loved the world that He gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in Him, shall not perish, but have everlasting life.

Thanks be to God for "whosoevers" written into Third's story.

And as Third opens door to another Stewardship Season, you will travel familiar roads:

It is an adventure on The Jericho Road! Therefore, let us consecrate ourselves, walk in love and run the good race while fixing our eyes on Jesus—preparing to steward Third into year 176.

### Mission Focus October: News from Kihomi and Nzunga

From Kihomi and Nzunga's Newsletters, September 3 & 4, 2025

Dear Loved Ones,

Greetings. Many of you have been wondering about the whereabout of Nzunga & Kihomi. Thank you for your concerns, your prayers, and your support. We do not take your love for us and our ministries for granted. We are still in mission serving the Almighty God in Haiti and the Dominican Republic.

Kihomi went to the Democratic Republic of Congo to visit her aged mother who had a stroke that has left her completely paralyzed the left side. The day Kihomi arrived to greet the mother, it was the day the mother was going to exit this world. Thanks to Kihomi's quick thinking and action, the mother is still alive today and doing relatively well for her situation and for her age. What was going to kill my mother-in-law? Malaria and dehydration.

While Kihomi was in Congo, I went to Haiti where I spent almost 3 good weeks working at the eye clinic. I was positively impressed by how the staff of the eye clinic carry themselves at work. It seems that everybody has really mastered the lesson learned from watching THE ANTS in Proverbs 6:6. No need to tell them what to do.

You are watching here the images of the deterioration of the building of the Eye Clinic; This FORTRESS built during the colonial time is still the strongest building one is likely to find in the of Cap-Haitian. To most of us the building is run down and there is no way to use it for medical purposes. Most of our people do not have that kind of choice. They just care about the treatment of their eyes they get. The time I was there this summer, I worked hard to restore the water system until running again all over. We have 7 functioning toilettes, 6 sinks / lavabos and 2 full showers. Today the staff and their patients cannot stop thanking God.



What is destroying our fortress? The building is built a couple of feet from the ocean bay. The salty air from the ocean hit the building hard. The building has two big roofs that are directly exposed to and get plenty of tropical sun and rains. The metal sheets that cover the roofs are hit day and night by salty air from the ocean bay. Thus, they become too rusty. When it rains it pours, and the rain penetrates though the rusty nails. The rain destroys the ceiling and the paint in the walls.

- We have not suffered in a way Jesus does not understand.

Dr. Mole is an award-winning young organist, having brought home first place in 2017 from the International Musashino-Tokyo Organ Competition, one of the largest and most prestigious organ competitions in the world. She also was the first-place and audience prize winner of the Miami International Organ Competition in 2016, and the first-place winner of the Arthur Poister Organ Competition and the John Rodland Memorial Organ Competition in 2014. Since 2017, she has served as a juror for live and preliminary rounds for several organ competitions and, in 2016, Amanda was chosen as one of The Diapason magazine's Top 20 Under 30, a feature that selects some of the most successful young artists in the field. Originally from Holden, Massachusetts, Dr. Mole holds degrees from the Eastman School of music, and the Yale Institute of Sacred Music.



Her program here will include not only works for organ, but transcriptions of orchestral works that the organ of Third Baptist handles particularly well.
